HIGH HOLY DAYS PROGRAMS

In addition to evening and morning services in the sanctuary, Temple Beth Shalom offers these related programs. No advance registration is required, except as noted for child care. Information for the High Holy Days can also be found on the [temple website](http://www.annapolistemple.org).

S'lichot

The High Holy Days season starts on Saturday, September 5, with *S'lichot*. The evening will start with the movie *Philomena* at 6:45pm. *Philomena* is a moving true story about Philomena Lee, an Irish woman searching for the son who was taken from her decades earlier by a convent. With the help of a journalist, she uncovers a powerful story of loss, resilience, forgiveness, and family. The *S'lichot* service follows at 9pm with our adult choir *Nashira* and Cantorial Soloist Ken Isman participating. Please join us anytime during the evening. For security reasons we are asking you to RSVP for either the movie and/or the service. Please email info@annapolistemple.org to RSVP. Traditionally the service is held at midnight the Saturday before *Rosh HaShanah*, but we'll be out well before then.

JUNIOR CONGREGATION AND CONGREGATION K-3

Starting at 10am on *Rosh HaShanah* and *Yom Kippur*, concurrent with the services in the sanctuary, we will offer programs for children in kindergarten through grade 3, as well as Junior Congregation for students in grades 4 through 7. Any children not participating in these programs should be either in [child care](#) (reservations required) or at home. For safety reasons we cannot allow anyone to roam the building or play outside while services are held.

CHILDREN'S SERVICE

Rabbi Goldstein will lead a free short service geared to young children at 2pm on *Rosh HaShanah* in the sanctuary. For security reasons, registration for this service is required. [Click here to RSVP](#).

Tashlich

Join us at 4pm on Saturday, September 12, at Stonington Beach. *Tashlich* is a centuries-old custom of going to a place of natural flowing water on *Rosh HaShanah* and symbolically casting off our sins by tossing breadcrumbs into the water. *Tashlich* is a great way to teach children about *t'shuvah* (repentance) and forgiveness in a tangible way. Directions will be available. Don't forget to BYOB (bring your own bread).

Kaddish

Many Jews visit the graves of loved ones during the High Holy Days, and Temple Beth Shalom has a section at Hillcrest Cemetery. We will gather at noon on Sunday, September 13, to say *kaddish* for our relatives and to place stones on the graves of temple members who are buried there.

Yom Kippur Afternoon Study

This program will provide an opportunity to continue to observe this important day of reflection in a meaningful way. Closer to the holiday, the weekly emails will provide information on the topic and leader.

N'ilah

Bring your *shofar* to the *N'ilah* service and join Rabbi Goldstein in the final *shofar* blast.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Please keep this information in mind to ensure that we all have a safe and happy High Holy Days experience.

SAFETY

If you see something concerning, please say something to an usher or security personnel—your awareness helps keep our community safe. When asked, please wear a name tag, as it helps our ushers and greeters identify and welcome everyone. For security reasons, all doors will remain locked during all services. If you need to leave and return, you may be asked to show ID or your ticket again, especially if the usher does not recognize you or a member of your family. Please note that bags may be checked at the entrance. Thank you for helping us create a safe, welcoming, and meaningful High Holy Days experience for all.

PARKING AND ACCESSIBILITY

As our congregation grows and more people come to temple for High Holy Days services, the job of our volunteer parking attendants also grows. They will do their best to help everyone find a spot in our parking lot and on the grass lot beyond the paved section. You can help by carpooling whenever possible. Ample parking will be available for anyone with Maryland handicap tags or a hangtag. Drop-off is allowed at the walkway at the front of the building for those who have trouble walking distances. **Parking on B&A Boulevard or beside the driveway is prohibited.**

Hearing assistive devices are available upon request. A row of easily accessible seats will be reserved for people with mobility issues. The sanctuary has several spots that will accommodate a wheelchair.

HEALTH

We encourage everyone to attend in person, if possible; however, services will also be live-streamed for those who prefer to join remotely. The decision to wear a mask or maintain distance from others rests with each individual.

ETIQUETTE

In order to make our High Holy Days services meaningful and pleasant for everyone, please remember these guidelines.

- Please silence your cell phone.
- Do not enter or exit the sanctuary while people are standing in prayer, while the ark is open, or during the rabbi's sermon.
- Out of respect for fellow worshippers, please refrain from conversation during services and in the entry ways. Appropriate places to visit with friends include the lobby, outdoors, and the parking lot.
- There is no smoking in or around the synagogue building.
- Bring your own *tallit* to services.
- No food or beverages (including water) are allowed in the sanctuary at any time. There is a water fountain near the bathrooms.

PRAYER BOOKS

We have a limited number of prayer books. Purchasing a prayer book is the only way to guarantee that you will have one of your own. See the prayer book form below or [online here](#).

DONATIONS

It is customary to make a contribution to the synagogue for the High Holy Days. You may earmark your donation for a specific part of our observance, such as the music. Please send a note with your contribution to indicate your dedication. You can make your donations through [ShulCloud](#).

FOOD COLLECTION

Temple Beth Shalom collects food annually for My Brother's Pantry. Ushers will distribute shopping bags on *Rosh HaShanah*, and we encourage you to fill one (or more) with non-perishable food and return them on *Yom Kippur*. As we fast on *Yom Kippur*, let us help care for those for whom inadequate food is not a choice.

HIGH HOLY DAYS MUSIC



LENA GOLDSTEIN is thrilled to be joining her Temple Beth Shalom family, Rabbi Goldstein, and the Annapolis Chorale as our Cantorial Soloist for High Holy Days services again this year. She graduated cum laude from Yale University, where she performed regularly with the Opera Theatre of Yale College, Yale Undergraduate Chamber Orchestra, Yale Baroque Opera Project, and Yale Glee Club. She recently earned her Master's in Music Performance in Voice at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and is working for the Park City Opera Company in Utah.



J. ERNEST GREEN is the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Annapolis Chorale and Chamber Orchestra. He has an active career as a guest conductor and lives in Severna Park with his wife Molly, their children Alec and Ella, and their black lab Kensi. A graduate of the Peabody Conservatory of Music, he has brought his wide knowledge of sacred and secular music to enhance our High Holy Days services for the past 19 years, generously coaching and guiding our cantors, student cantors, soloists, choir members, and members of the Annapolis Chorale. He and Laurie Hays will share the conductor's baton this year.



Singer and pianist **LAURIE J. HAYS** directs the women's ensemble, Cantori, with Live Arts Maryland, is on the music staff at St. Anne's Episcopal Church in Annapolis, and is a collaborative pianist and accompanist. She lives in Severn, MD with her husband, Kevin, and two dogs. Over the years of her participation at Temple Beth Shalom, she has had many roles, including directing the singers outside the sanctuary building during covid while the rabbi and cantor sang inside. This year, Laurie will serve as our pianist and will conduct the women's ensemble on *Yom Kippur* afternoon.



YIZKOR BOOK

An important part of our High Holy Days ritual and spirit is remembering those whom death has taken from us. We will distribute a *yizkor* (memorial) book at the *Yom Kippur yizkor* service. The book will contain the names of individuals whom our congregants and friends wish to remember, as well as the names that appear on our memorial plaques. The names of those who died during the past year will be read aloud at the *yizkor* service.

Our *yizkor* (memorial) book serves as a personal and community symbol of enduring faith and remembrance. You can honor the memory of your loved ones in a meaningful way by listing their names in it. As shown in the example below, we will print only the names of the deceased so please do not include relationships or other personal messages.

It is customary to make a donation in honor of those memorialized in the *yizkor* book. Although the amount of such a contribution is entirely at your discretion, we suggest, as a guideline, \$36 (double *chai*) for each name printed. *Chai* means life in Hebrew. We appreciate your generosity.

HIGH HOLY DAYS PRAYER BOOKS



The Reform Movement's *machzor* is called *Mishkan HaNefesh*. The prayer books come in sets of 2, a slimmer gold book for *Rosh HaShanah* and a thicker silver book for *Yom Kippur*. They are laid out much like our *Shabbat siddur*, *Mishkan T'fillah*, with Hebrew and a translation on the right-hand page and related readings on the left-hand page. In addition, the books include transliterations of the Hebrew.

We encourage our members to purchase their own copy of *Mishkan HaNefesh*. The books can be personalized on the inside front cover.

The price of *Mishkan HaNefesh* is \$54 for the set of 2 books. The deadline for ordering the prayerbooks is September 4.

CHILD CARE REQUEST

Child care will be available for children of temple members from 6 months to pre-kindergarten on Saturday, September 12, during our morning *Rosh HaShanah* service and on Monday, September 21, during our morning *Yom Kippur* service. We can accommodate **only 10** children on each holiday and will take reservations in the order in which they are received. Advance registration is required so we can be properly staffed and can provide quality child care. Walk-ins will not be admitted. There is no fee for child care, but you must pre-register your child by returning the child care form. The deadline to register is **Friday, September 4**.

HIGH HOLY DAYS TICKETS

will be electronic this year



The maximum number of tickets your household will receive will be based on your family's information in ShulCloud. The heads of each household receive tickets, as do children **ages 13 to 25**. If you have a child over the age of 21 or need guest tickets, you will be able to purchase additional tickets.

Once the High Holy Days ticket registration is completed you will receive an email with a QR code with your household's High Holy Days tickets. Just like if you were to go to a movie or a concert, you must save this QR code on your phone, or you can print it if you like. When you come to High Holy Days services, you will show your QR code or the printed ticket and be asked to put on a name tag.

Everyone will enter the building through the lobby. No one over 13 years of age will be admitted to the sanctuary building without a ticket. *Yom Kippur* afternoon services are free, but we ask if you have a family member coming you RSVP in the temple office at info@annapolistemple.org, so we know to expect them. **All tickets are non-transferrable.**

Members can request tickets for adult children living at home or attending college and for out-of-town relatives. The price is \$75 for each person. It is preferable to [purchase tickets online](#).
